Human Access for Partnership and Development (HUMAN ACCESS) was founded in Yemen on March 19, 1990, by a group of volunteers and community leaders. It is an independent, non-profit humanitarian and development organization that operates with dynamism and renewed energy to secure lives and alleviate human suffering, regardless of who or where they are, and to advance sustainable development.

This is achieved through the implementation of targeted, well-planned, and impactful projects and programs in essential and vital sectors, based on comprehensive needs assessments and in accordance with the principles and standards of humanitarian work.



## Objectives

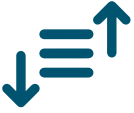
- To reduce the spread of hunger, poverty, and unemployment in Yemen.

## Work Priorities

HUMAN ACCESS prioritizes humanitarian interventions, focusing on the most urgent needs of people, while also considering the developmental dimension and working in coordination with other humanitarian organizations. With its accumulated experience and unique capabilities, the organization focuses on projects that are most beneficial to beneficiaries and on priority groups within the community, such as women, children, orphans, internally displaced persons, refugees, youth, the elderly, and people with disabilities.

HUMAN ACCESS is also focused on priority areas, including food, health, shelter, education, protection, water, sanitation, livelihoods, and others, based on a comprehensive needs assessment and in coordination with partners, official authorities, and local communities.



## Work Methodology

HUMAN ACCESS operates with renewed determination and a clear vision that links relief and development, combining urgent response with sustainability. It manages projects with thoughtful humanitarianism and rapid field action to ensure the desired humanitarian and developmental impact with the highest levels of effectiveness and transparency, according to the following parameters and steps:

- Designing projects to address needs according to priorities.
- Marketing projects.
- Signing contracts with donors.
- Commencing project implementation.
- Documenting projects at all stages of implementation.
- Submitting project progress reports to funding agencies.
- Evaluating projects with stakeholders.
- Assessing the impact of projects on the community.



## General Strategy

HUMAN ACCESS in Yemen operates according to a clear vision, positioning itself as a leading authority on humanitarian and development work both locally and regionally. This is due to its extensive field experience, successful track record, and effective partnerships with numerous regional and international organizations and bodies.

In line with this vision, HUMAN ACCESS pursues a mission focused on contributing to development and alleviating poverty in Yemeni society and some countries in the Horn of Africa. It leverages volunteer efforts and partnerships with local communities and donor organizations to achieve its strategic goals and objectives, prioritizing rural areas and internally displaced persons (IDP) communities, and focusing on the most vulnerable social groups, particularly youth, women, and children.

The organization's overall strategy is based on its commitment to supporting humanitarian efforts in Yemen, both locally and regionally. HUMAN ACCESS adheres to the most important fundamental principles, values, and humanitarian standards agreed upon by the international humanitarian community, particularly transparency, professionalism, independence, impartiality, working within institutional frameworks, accountability, quality, development, and partnership with the local, regional, and international humanitarian system. In terms of intervention priorities, the organization seeks to participate in addressing the various developmental and humani-

HUMAN ACCESS plays a vital role in accelerating progress towards achieving the 2030 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) through a network of interconnected humanitarian, development, and social projects and programs. HUMAN ACCESS's contributions are diverse and include active participation in achieving the following goals:

**Goal 3: Good Health and Well-being** by: sustainably strengthening the health system, enhancing healthcare, addressing malnutrition, combating disease outbreaks and epidemics, ensuring access to medicines and medical supplies, providing reproductive health services, and more.

**Goal 4: Quality Education** by expanding safe and equitable access to education at all levels through various interventions, including the construction, renovation, and rehabilitation of educational facilities, the provision of educational supplies, support for the educational process, and others.

**Goal 5: Gender Equality** by addressing the challenges faced by women, promoting and empowering the rights of women and girls, creating more opportunities for women to work and achieve financial independence, and supporting



their participation in all aspects of life.

**Goal 6: Clean Water and Sanitation** by supporting the water and sanitation sector, providing clean and safe water, delivering sanitation services, and promoting hygiene and environmental health practices.

**Goal 7: Affordable and Clean Energy** by installing solar energy systems and expanding the use of renewable and clean energy technologies.

**Goal 8: Decent Work and Economic Growth** through vocational and technical training programs, job creation, the provision of sustainable livelihoods, the promotion of household financial sustainability, and the encouragement of production, among others.

and communities, and that support stability and public life.

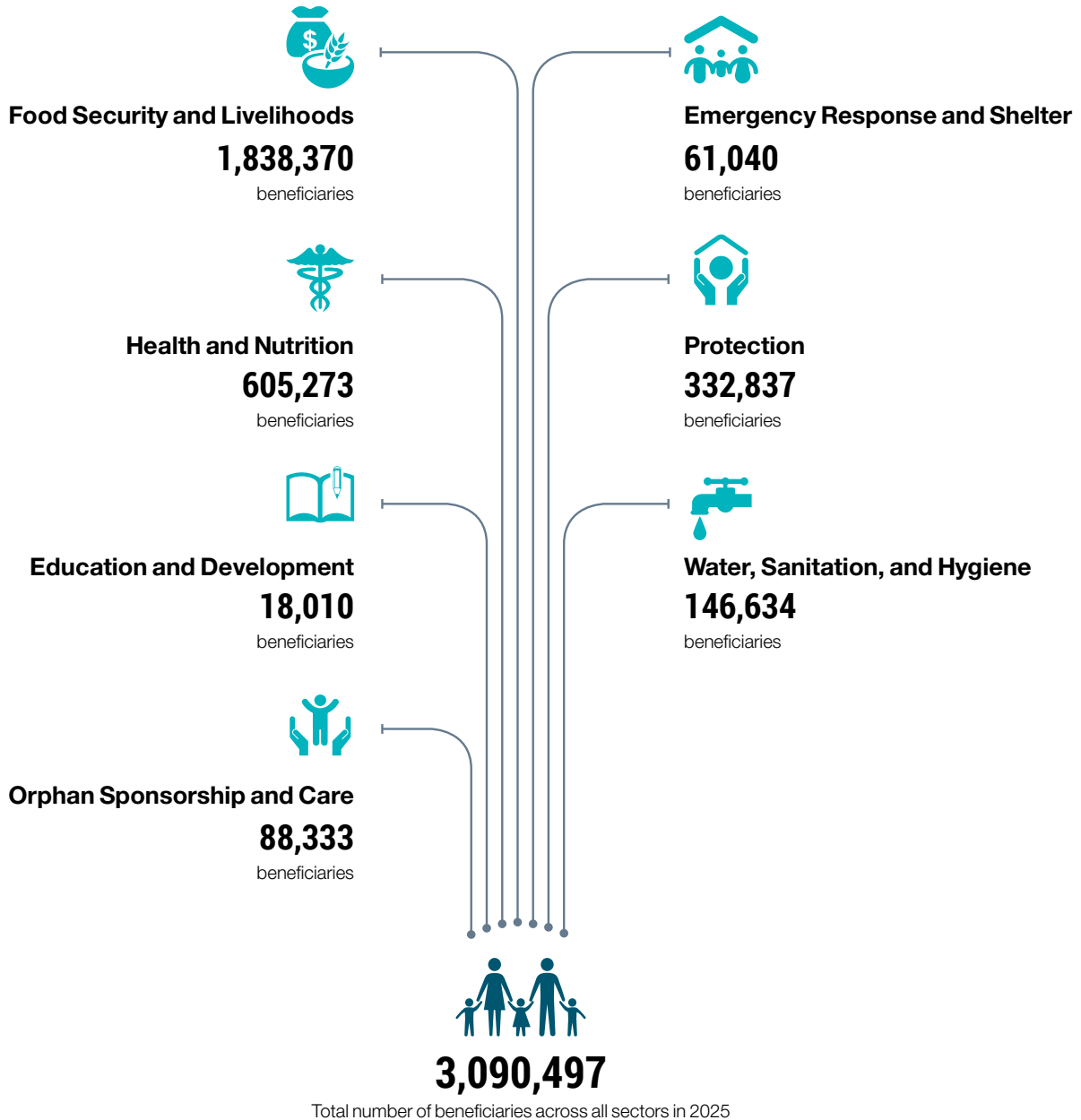

## 1. General Food Aid Project (GFA)

A major humanitarian achievement, it embodies the tremendous efforts to prevent further deterioration in food security and strengthen the resilience of vulnerable Yemeni families in combating hunger, thus contributing to the achievement of the Sustainable Development Goals, foremost among them the eradication of poverty and hunger.

More than one million people benefited from the GFA project during 2025, a significant number that reflects the positive impact of this project, implemented by HUMAN ACCESS in 21 districts across the governorates of Lahj and Taiz, with funding from the World Food Program (WFP).

The services provided by this vital project included the distribution of diverse food baskets to support the daily nutritional needs of the most vulnerable families, in addition to the distribution of cash assistance, considered one of the most effective interventions to help families secure their food needs with dignity.

## 2. Social Welfare

Continuing a long-standing approach that prioritizes the needs of the vulnerable, HUMAN ACCESS contributes to improving the living conditions of the neediest families through a range of seasonal projects funded by generous partners. These include Ramadan projects, the Udhiyah (Qurbani) project, and the distribution of Eid and winter clothing.

More than 300,000 people across Yemen benefited from the Ramadan projects in 1446 AH (2025), which involved: distributing food baskets containing essential food items to meet families' daily needs; delivering ready-made meals; setting up Iftar tables; supplying dates, meat, and milk; and donating Zakat al-Fitr (charity given at the end of Ramadan).

Over 460,000 individuals benefited from the distribution of 302 tons of meat through the Udhiyah project, implemented through an integrated operational system that adheres to all Sharia, health, and veterinary requirements. More than 15,000 people benefited from the distribution of Eid and winter clothing.

Through this initiative, the organization contributed to bringing joy to children during Eid al-Fitr and Eid al-Adha, empowering vulnerable people to cope with the harsh winter cold, and mitigating health risks resulting from severe climatic conditions, especially in displacement camps. This reflects the genuine nature of our humanitarian work, which extends both within and outside Yemen.



### 3. Economic Empowerment Projects

HUMAN ACCESS is not limited to providing humanitarian aid; it also includes supporting livelihoods by providing income-generating projects for vulnerable groups. This enhances their productive capacity and reduces their dependence on aid amidst the humanitarian challenges imposed by the current situation in Yemen.

This underscores the importance of the small economic projects granted in 2025 in partnership with AMOUDA organization. These projects, covering areas such as sewing, livestock breeding, and transportation, benefited 618 people in the governorates of Hadhramaut and Marib. Those beneficiaries were able to become self-reliant, provide for their families' basic needs, and maintain their dignity.

# Emergency Response and Shelter

## 1. Emergency Relief

HUMAN ACCESS is based on extensive experience in dealing with humanitarian crises and natural disasters. It provides an advanced model for rapid relief to alleviate immediate suffering, provide basic necessities, and preserve the dignity of those affected.

During 2025, with the support of donors and partners, implemented emergency relief projects reached more than eight thousand people in all Yemeni governorates, reflecting a high capacity for reaching those affected by crises and disasters and for responding to humanitarian emergencies.

These projects helped save lives and alleviate human suffering. Cash assistance proved effective and efficient in responding to humanitarian crises, enabling beneficiaries to purchase their needs according to their priorities. Various food aid packages were also provided, directly impacting the lives of beneficiaries.

## 2. Emergency Response for Yemeni Refugees in Djibouti

In response to the basic needs of thousands of Yemeni refugees in the Republic of Djibouti, HUMAN ACCESS continues its efforts with donors and partners to support this most vulnerable group and the overburdened host communities.

In 2025, more than 24,000 Yemeni refugees and members of the host community benefited from various forms of humanitarian assistance. This included the distribution of essential food items to meet the daily needs of families and improve the living conditions of the most vulnerable.

The distribution of sacrificial meat to those in need, orphanages, and hospitals also aimed to extend support to beneficiaries during Eid al-Adha. This act embodies a profound humanitarian message, reflecting the values of generosity and solidarity, and bringing smiles and joy to the faces of those in need, wherever they may be.



### 3. Shelter Aid and Materials

At a time when the need for humanitarian support is escalating due to the increasing displacement and deteriorating economic conditions in Yemen, HUMAN ACCESS continues to provide shelter materials to displaced families and those affected by the ongoing crisis in the country.

In 2025, more than 27,000 individuals benefited from shelter aid provided with the support of donor partners. This aid involved the supply of tents, blankets, mattresses, kitchen utensils, and other essential items needed in vulnerable situations.

The importance of the distributed shelter aid lies in alleviating the burdens placed on the most vulnerable groups and strengthening the foundations for a dignified life amidst humanitarian, economic, and social challenges, which positively impacts the stability of families and society as a whole.

#### 4. Providing Housing Services for Affected People

During 2025, HUMAN ACCESS, in collaboration with partners and donors, offered housing services to those affected by the conflict. Among these services were building homes and providing rental assistance, recognizing housing as a fundamental humanitarian pillar for preserving human dignity.

These services helped 318 affected people regain a sense of dignity and security, providing them with privacy, ensuring a minimum level of psychological and social stability, and protecting them from harsh weather conditions during a time of crisis.

Several beneficiaries expressed their gratitude for this humanitarian support, which addressed their immediate and urgent needs. They stated that they had faced significant difficulties accessing these services due to the war and displacement, and emphasized their immense happiness at receiving this timely support.

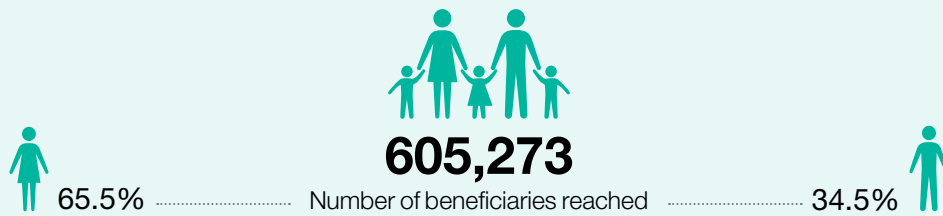

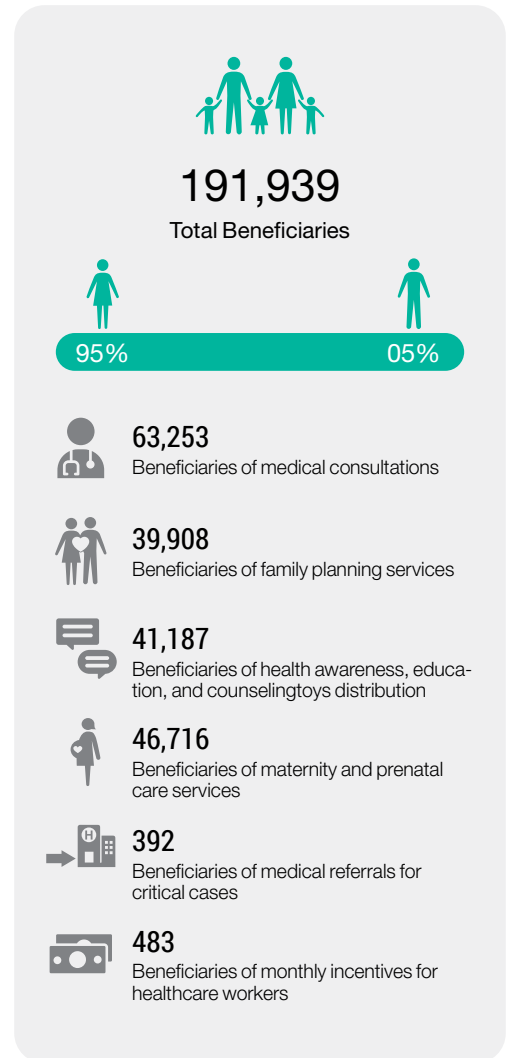


## 1. Supporting Reproductive Health Services

Reproductive health services stand out as one of the most critical humanitarian needs in Yemen. The Supporting Reproductive Health Services Project is one of the leading health projects executed by HUMAN ACCESS in 2025, in partnership with the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), to address life-saving reproductive health needs.

This project provided a vital range of essential reproductive health services to women without access to safe havens. These services involved family planning, medical consultations, maternity care, health education and awareness, and monthly financial incentives for healthcare workers. These services were delivered through 15 health facilities across six governorates.

In support of reproductive health services, a reproductive health voucher program was also implemented in remote and conflict-affected areas. Through 11 health facilities, the program provided urgently needed medical services for women, including voluntary family planning, maternal health, and maternity care. This aimed to reduce maternal and neonatal mortality and improve family health within an overburdened health system.

## 2. Providing Minimum Health Services for Children and Mothers

Amidst a severe deterioration in health services, HUMAN ACCESS contributes to improving the health of children and mothers in Yemen. It strives to provide a minimum level of health services to these vulnerable groups, who deserve special priority, particularly in war-affected communities, including Taiz, one of Yemen's most densely populated cities.

In partnership with DWWT and NAS organizations, over 100,000 people in Taiz benefited in 2025 from health services provided to children and mothers through the Al-Wafa Health Center in Al-Muzafar District. These services included dispensing medication, immunization services, therapeutic feeding for malnourished children and mothers, safe delivery services, and other vital services that played a crucial role in the recovery of beneficiaries and maximized life-saving impact.



### 3. The Medical Clinic in Al-Rawda Camp for IDPs in Marib

Marib Governorate hosts the largest number of internally displaced persons (IDPs) in Yemen. To ensure access to basic healthcare for the most vulnerable IDPs, HUMAN ACCESS, in collaboration with IHH organization, operated a medical clinic in Al-Rawda Camp.

From January to November 2025, more than 35,000 IDPs benefited from the clinic's services, such as medical consultations and medication dispensing, childhood immunizations, family planning, therapeutic feeding for malnourished children and mothers, and prenatal care.

Without this medical clinic, IDPs would face significant difficulties accessing life-saving healthcare, and health risks would be greatly exacerbated, especially given the spread of diseases and epidemics and the collapse of the country's health system amidst one of the world's worst protracted humanitarian crises.

#### 4. Basic Health and Nutrition Services Project

Amid the ongoing conflict in Yemen, malnutrition is widespread among children under five, becoming one of the country's major health crises.

To combat this grave threat to the lives of vulnerable children, HUMAN ACCESS, in partnership with AMOUDA organization, launched a project to provide life-saving basic health and nutrition services to malnourished children under five.

Over five months, through the Kara General Hospital in Marib Governorate, the project provided services to more than 22,000 people. Among these services were providing medical supplies, therapeutic nutrition for children, pregnant women, and lactating mothers, and health and nutrition education for mothers and families, contributing to the long-term reduction of malnutrition.

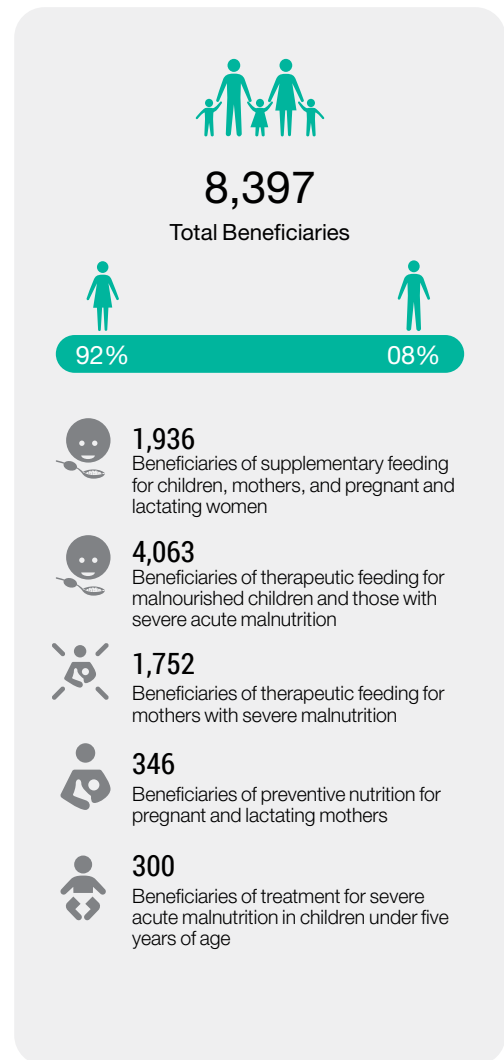


## 5. Malnutrition Treatment Programs

HUMAN ACCESS is one of the leading humanitarian organizations in Yemen working to provide therapeutic, preventative, and supplementary nutrition needed by children, pregnant women, and lactating mothers to survive.

In 2025, the organization successfully delivered nutrition to more than 8,000 children and women in the governorates of Aden, Lahj, Taiz, and Marib, including refugees, in collaboration with several aid and health partners, to reduce deaths resulting from malnutrition.

The interventions were not limited to providing nutrition alone, but also extended to treating children under five years of age suffering from severe acute malnutrition. This reflects HUMAN ACCESS's commitment to protecting lives and providing vital health support in an effective and direct manner.

## 6. The Refugee Health Project

The Refugee Health Project is a prime example of the vital role HUMAN ACCESS plays in protecting the health of refugees in Al-Basateen area and Kharaz camp, in the governorates of Aden and Lahj. This project, implemented in partnership with UNHCR, reached over 198,000 refugees in 2025, representing one of the most vulnerable and affected groups in the humanitarian crisis in Yemen.

The project's services involved a wide range of essential health services such as primary healthcare, medication, physiotherapy, psychosocial support, immunization, safe delivery services, reproductive health services, support for refugees with disabilities, and other services that provided a lifeline for these refugees.



## 7. Multi-Sectoral Aid Project to Save Lives of Highly Vulnerable Populations

In 2025, the Multi-Sectoral Aid Project to Save Lives of Highly Vulnerable Populations had a positive impact on the lives of more than 42,000 beneficiaries in Al-Shihr District, Hadhramaut Governorate.

This important project, carried out by HUMAN ACCESS and funded by the Yemen Humanitarian Fund (YHF), covered several vital services, such as medical consultations, family planning services, psychosocial support, and health awareness and education.

The project's services extended to include maternity care, medical referrals for critical cases, childhood immunizations, monthly financial incentives for healthcare workers, and life-saving health services to build resilient communities and create a better future for all.

## 8. Health and Drug Support

Providing health and drug support to vulnerable groups in Yemen is a fundamental part of the humanitarian response for HUMAN ACCESS, as it is part of universal health coverage and significantly contributes to alleviating the suffering of many patients.

In 2025, humanitarian partnerships with several donors resulted in offering health and drug support to 736 beneficiaries in the governorates of Aden, Hadhramaut, Taiz, and Marib. This support involved the installation of medical equipment, provision of medications, surgical procedures, dialysis sessions, and the supply of wheelchairs and electric wheelchairs for people with disabilities.

A number of beneficiaries expressed their gratitude for this health and drug support, emphasizing that it mitigated their suffering, improved their health, directly addressed their needs, and restored hope after years of deprivation and health challenges.

## 1. Safe Spaces and Psychosocial Support

HUMAN ACCESS is one of the leading humanitarian organizations in HUMAN ACCESS places the protection of women and girls at the heart of its priorities, as they are among the most affected by the repercussions of the ongoing conflict in Yemen. Protecting them at this time is essential for protecting the entire community and safeguarding the future.

During 2025, various forms of protection were provided to women and girls, such as psychological support through Al-Shihr Health Center in Hadhramaut, and the establishment and management of 11 safe spaces for women and girls in seven governorates. These spaces offered health, social, and legal services, helping women cope with accumulated psychological and economic burdens, particularly those who bore multiple roles within the family or had experienced violence.

These vital services, supported by the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), benefited more than 150,000 people, contributing to the protection of the most vulnerable groups, strengthening the resilience of women and girls in the face of crises, and opening windows of hope for a more stable and peaceful future.

## 2. Life-Saving Protection Services for Displaced Persons

In the face of the catastrophic humanitarian situation in Yemen, HUMAN ACCESS association plays a crucial role in providing life-saving protection services to displaced persons struggling to survive amidst one of the world's most complex and protracted humanitarian crises.

Among these vital services are skills development, cash assistance, granting economic empowerment toolkits, and the delivery of dignity kits containing essential items, particularly for women, as well as community awareness campaigns, given the crucial role community awareness plays in driving positive change.

Thanks to a pioneering partnership with the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), these life-saving services reached more than 98,000 displaced people (IDPs) in the governorates of Aden, Hadhramaut, Al-Mahrah, Marib, Shabwah, Taiz, and Hodeidah during 2025, boosting their resilience to the harsh realities of displacement.

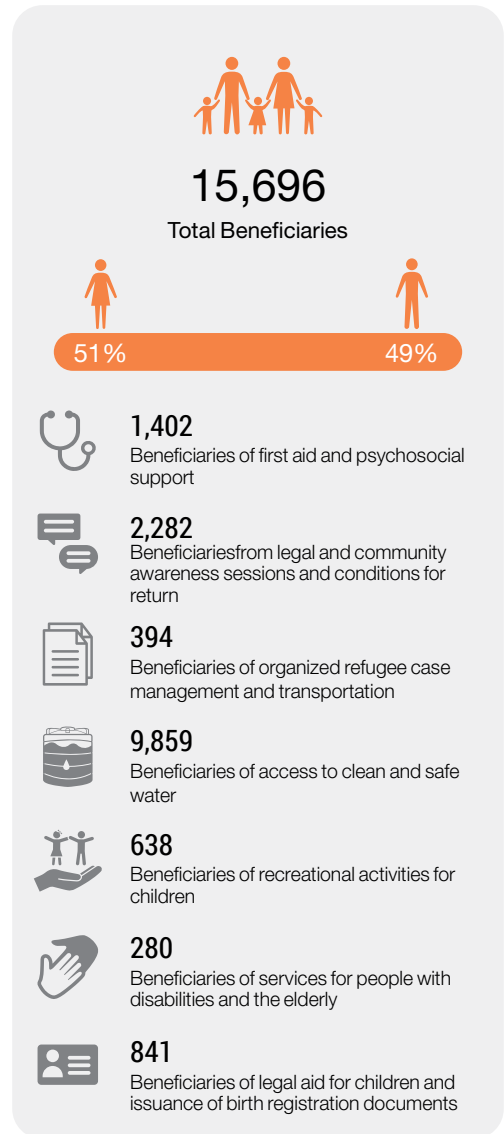


### 3. Protection Services for Refugees

Despite the worsening humanitarian crisis in Yemen, the country continues to host thousands of refugees from the Horn of Africa. Many of these refugees reside in Kharaz camp in Lahj Governorate and face severe protection risks, making protection services an urgent humanitarian necessity.

The extensive efforts undertaken by HUMAN ACCESS in 2025, in collaboration with UNHCR, successfully delivered vital protection services to over 15,000 refugees in Kharaz camp, helping them access their basic rights and enabling them to enjoy a better life.

The protection services rendered to refugees involved health, psychological, and legal support; counseling sessions on the conditions for return to their countries of origin; supply of safe drinking water; implementation of recreational activities for children; issuance of birth registration documents; and other essential services for the protection of the most vulnerable and needy refugees.

#### 4. The Integrated Three-Sector Project

The Integrated Three-Sector Project is a leading humanitarian initiative executed by HUMAN ACCESS, in partnership with UNHCR, to protect the most vulnerable groups from the risks associated with the conflict in Yemen.

Implemented in Marib Governorate, the project targeted internally displaced persons (IDPs), refugees, returnees, and host communities to enhance their resilience to crises through an integrated, multi-sectoral response. This response addressed the most urgent needs and ensured the management of six displacement sites, including inter-agency coordination, site infrastructure improvements through quick-impact projects, and the promotion of community participation.

A key objective of the project is to protect the most vulnerable groups from the risks associated with the conflict in Yemen. A range of protection services were also provided, including: managing child-friendly spaces, responding to gender-based violence, and supporting access to identity documents, recognizing them as a human right and a necessity for public life.

The project also provided a variety of shelter services, including: rehabilitating damaged homes and granting direct cash aid to meet urgent needs and prevent beneficiaries from resorting to desperate survival strategies. These and other services reached more than 67,000 beneficiaries during 2025.



## 5. Girls' Protection and Empowerment Program through an Entrepreneurial Approach

In Yemen, a country ravaged by crises, the importance of protecting and empowering women is paramount. They are the cornerstone of family stability and future building, and a pivotal element in any response that seeks to create a real and sustainable impact.

This is precisely what the Girls' Protection and Empowerment Program through an Entrepreneurial Approach, executed by HUMAN ACCESS in the governorates of Taiz and Hodeidah, with funding from UNICEF, achieved. In 2025, over a thousand people benefited from this program.

This unique program equipped beneficiary women with the life and vocational skills necessary to enter the labor market and granted them essential toolkits to help them establish their own businesses and become self-reliant. This preserves women's role and status within society and positively impacts the stability of the family as a whole.

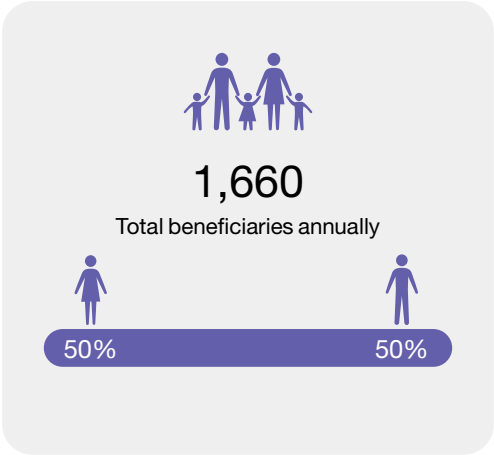

## 1. Construction and equipping of IT and Computer Science College at Saba Region University

Despite the worsening humanitarian crisis in Yemen, the country In a significant step to strengthen the infrastructure of higher education in Yemen, HUMAN ACCESS, in partnership with the International Islamic Charitable Organization (IICO), executed the first phase of the project to construct and equip the College of Information Technology and Computer Science building at Saba Region University in Marib Governorate.

The college building involves fully equipped computer labs, modern administrative facilities, service facilities, a large multi-purpose hall, and other amenities that contribute to providing a suitable and stimulating learning environment that meets the aspirations of future generations. This makes the project an educational and developmental investment with a direct impact on the present and future of the governorate.

## 2. Construction of first phase of the Hafsa Education and Development Center in Hadhramaut

Based on a firm belief that education is the cornerstone of achieving the sustainable development goals, HUMAN ACCESS, in collaboration with AMOUDA organization, launched the first phase of construction of the Hafsa Education and Development Center in Seiyun District, Hadhramaut Governorate.

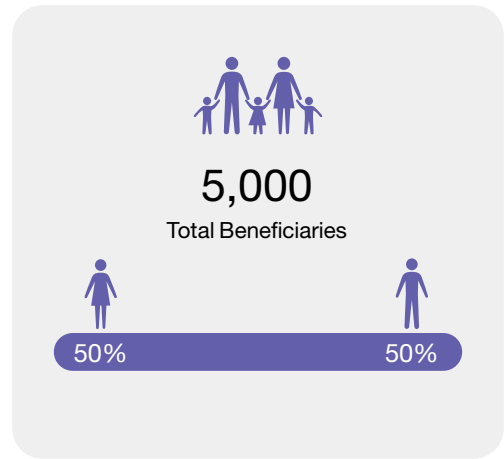
The first phase included the construction of modern classrooms, vocational training halls, and specialized computer labs. This will help provide a suitable learning environment for students and trainees from among young men, women, and girls, enhancing their future opportunities in the labor market and contributing to building a brighter future for Yemen.



### 3. Providing schools in Aden with educational supplies and water tankst

HUMAN ACCESS support to education in Yemen extends beyond the construction and equipping of school buildings to include the provision of educational supplies, stationery, and water tanks to improve the learning environment. This support stems from the organization's belief that the right to education is a fundamental human right and its recognition of the vital role education plays in enhancing human capital and driving comprehensive development.

In 2025, HUMAN ACCESS delivered educational supplies, stationery, and water tanks to ten schools in Aden Governorate, benefiting 5,000 male and female students, as part of ongoing efforts to improve the quality of education.

#### 4. Rehabilitation and furnishing of the Happy Child School for Students with Down Syndrome in Hadhramaut

In a unique project, HUMAN ACCESS, in partnership with Sadakat Care Association, rehabilitated and furnished the Happy Child School for students with Down syndrome in Seiyun, Hadhramaut Governorate.

The project covered comprehensive maintenance and renovation of the school, providing suitable infrastructure to meet the students' needs, supplying essential educational materials and resources, distributing school uniforms and bags, and installing a solar power system, thus contributing to the expansion of the use of renewable and clean energy technologies.

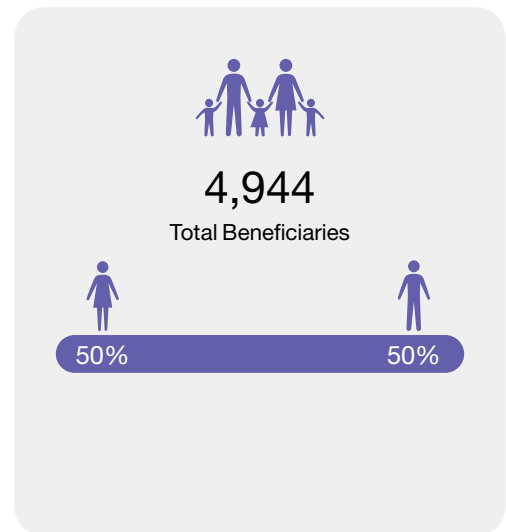
150 male and female students with Down syndrome, a genetic disorder that causes intellectual disability and learning difficulties, benefited from the project. This project will help them develop their language, personal, motion, and social skills, and integrate into society.



## 5. School Bag Project

The School Bag Project is part of a broader HUMAN ACCESS's program to support the education sector in Yemen. It involves distributing school bags and supplies to the most vulnerable students, including internally displaced persons and refugees, to prepare them for the start of a new school year with a positive attitude and psychological well-being, and to alleviate the financial burden of education on vulnerable families.

In 2025, with the support of partners and donors, 4,944 male and female students in the governorates of Taiz, Lahj, and Marib received school bags containing essential supplies to encourage them to return to school, reduce school dropout rates, and enhance learning opportunities, thus contributing to a long-term positive impact on the lives of individuals and communities.

## 6. Supporting Refugee Access to Education

To ensure that no one is left behind, HUMAN ACCESS supports the right of refugee children to education. In active partnership with UNHCR, the association contributed in 2025 to supporting access to primary and secondary education for more than 3,000 male and female refugees in Yemen.

This initiative was achieved through an integrated project launched in Kharaz refugee camp in Lahj, which carried out important activities, such as maintaining classrooms, providing educational supplies to schools, distributing textbooks and school uniforms to students, and training and financially incentivizing teachers to ensure the continuity of the teaching and learning process.

The project's support extended to providing supplies for summer activities and improving the learning environment to enable refugee and asylum-seeking children to access their fundamental right to education, in coordination with the Ministry of Education. Without this support, a large number of these children could become vulnerable to child labor or begging, which would have enormous and harmful long-term consequences.

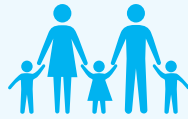

## 1. Water Supply

In light of the water crisis in Yemen, HUMAN ACCESS plays a vital role in increasing access to drinking water and water for daily use through well drilling and rehabilitation, and the rehabilitation of water distribution networks. This includes providing clean water via tankers, distributing water collection and storage containers, and other measures to mitigate the daily burdens faced by families in accessing water, given climate change and water scarcity in the country.

In 2025, a successful partnership with a group of donors improved access to clean and sustainable water for over 100,000 people, significantly alleviating their suffering, particularly for women and children, who bear the brunt of the water crisis.

These interventions had a tangible and positive impact on the beneficiary communities, enhancing their resilience to climate change and reducing the burden of purchasing water in a country facing one of the world's most complex humanitarian and environmental crises.

## 2. Sanitation

HUMAN ACCESS organization prioritizes sanitation services, given their vital importance to the lives of individuals and communities, and to upholding the human right to a healthy environment.

With funding from UNHCR, the organization executed a sanitation development project in Al-Suwaida IDP camp in Marib in 2025. This project, part of an integrated initiative, aimed to reduce the spread of diseases and epidemics associated with the lack of sanitation services and to contribute to improving the quality of life in displacement camps affected by the ongoing conflict in Yemen.

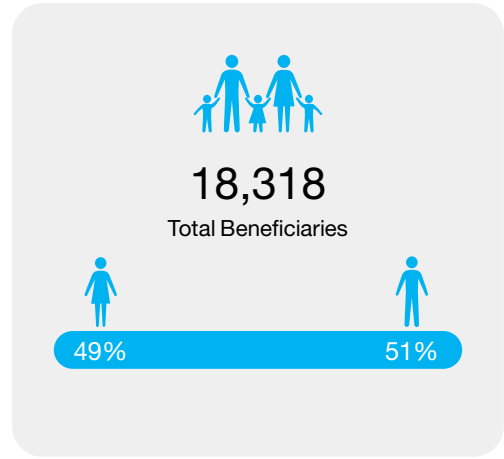
The project, implemented in the new residential block No. 16 in the camp, included the construction of a large septic tank with sedimentation ponds for wastewater treatment, as well as the establishment of a safe sewage network connecting all latrines to the collection tank. This protected displaced persons from health and environmental hazards and enhanced their sense of dignity, security, and stability.



### 3. Hygiene Enhancement

To promote hygiene, HUMAN ACCESS provided hygiene kits to internally displaced persons (IDPs), the host community, and health facilities in Al-Shihr District, Hadhramaut Governorate, during 2025. This was done through the Multi-Sectoral Assistance to Save Lives project, funded by the Yemen Humanitarian Fund (YHF).

The hygiene kits contained essential and comprehensive supplies, contributing to improved public health, disease prevention, and the promotion of healthy hygiene practices and behaviors. More than 18,000 people benefited from this initiative.

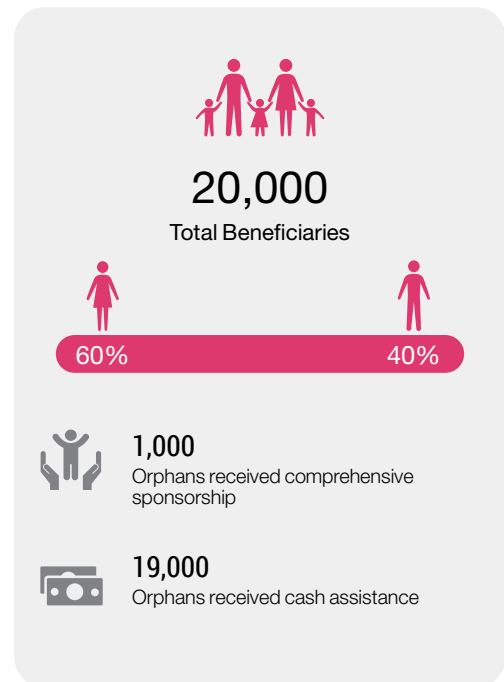


## 1. Orphan Sponsorship

The Orphan Sponsorship and Care Sector, under the umbrella of HUMAN ACCESS, is the largest orphan sponsorship organization in Yemen. It dedicates its efforts to alleviating the suffering of orphans, protecting their human rights, promoting social responsibility towards this vulnerable group, and fostering a sense of cooperation and solidarity with them.

With the support of generous donors and the assistance of partners, the sector was able to provide comprehensive sponsorship and cash aid to 20,000 male and female orphans in most Yemeni governorates during 2025. These funds were transferred regularly through local banks.

This financial aid had a significant and direct humanitarian impact on the lives of the beneficiary orphans, enabling them to purchase their needs according to their priorities and securing their livelihoods while preserving their dignity, without resorting to child labor or reducing their daily meals.

## 2. Providing Food for Orphans

HUMAN ACCESS focused on providing food for orphans in Yemen through the distribution of diverse food baskets, the organization of Ramadan iftar meals, and the delivery of ready-made meals to meet the daily nutritional needs of the most vulnerable and needy orphan families.

In 2025, over 41,000 orphans in most Yemeni governorates benefited from food projects carried out with the support of donors and partners. These projects are crucial because food is a basic need, and providing it is a daily struggle for orphan families.

Without this food assistance, orphans would face escalating levels of food insecurity, especially as Yemen remains mired in economic, humanitarian, and food crises that the United Nations classifies as the world's worst.



### 3. Supporting Orphan Education

To protect the right of orphans to education, HUMAN ACCESS, in collaboration with several donors, provided a package of educational interventions and support to ensure that this vulnerable group has access to education, a vital right and a prerequisite for recovery, peace, and social cohesion in Yemen.

These interventions covered supplying school uniforms and complete school bags, providing educational expenses, sponsoring university students, and other forms of support. In 2025, more than seven thousand male and female orphans in the governorates of Hadhramaut, Taiz, and Marib benefited from these initiatives and expressed their gratitude for this vital support, which helped them attend school regularly and gave them hope for a better future.

#### 4. Health Support for Orphans

HUMAN ACCESS prioritizes basic healthcare for orphans, giving them a chance at a healthy and stable life, as an essential part of the humanitarian response, especially given the collapse of the health system in Yemen due to the protracted conflict.

In 2025, with the support of donors and partners, over 12,000 male and female orphans in Hadhramaut, Taiz, and Marib benefited from medical assistance, examinations, and hygiene kits. This reflects a steadfast commitment to providing timely medical care to the most vulnerable orphans and helping them secure a healthy and fulfilling future.



## 5. Economic Empowerment of Orphans

HUMAN ACCESS adopted a supportive approach focused on empowering orphans' families in Yemen to become self-reliant, thereby creating sustainable income opportunities, improving living standards, and reducing dependence on aid. This is achieved through vocational training and rehabilitation, and economic empowerment, via specialized and well-designed programs in professions that are priorities in the local labor market, such as sewing and confectionery/ pastries. The goal is for orphans to become active participants in development, achieving self-sufficiency and becoming inspiring success stories in their lives and communities.

In 2025, the support of our partners contributed to the training, rehabilitation, and empowerment of approximately 1,400 male and female orphans in the governorates of Hadhramaut, Al-Mahrah, Shabwa, Taiz, and Marib. This humanitarian achievement opened doors to a dignified life for the beneficiary orphans' families and helped build a more stable future.

## 6. Providing Eid and Winter Clothing for Orphans

As a result of HUMAN ACCESS efforts and donor support, more than six thousand orphans benefited from the distribution of shelter materials. This initiative is part of ongoing and sustained efforts to alleviate the suffering of orphans, who represent one of the most vulnerable groups affected by the protracted humanitarian crisis in Yemen.

Among the support was providing mattresses and winter clothing to protect them from the harsh winter cold and other weather hazards, particularly orphans in displacement camps. Eid clothing and gifts were also donated to bring them joy during the holiday, enabling them to share in the festive spirit with their peers and fostering a sense of social solidarity.
